Modern Slavery

Types of Modern Slavery

Modern slavery in the UK can take many forms, including forced sexual exploitation, domestic slavery or forced labour on farms, in construction, shops, bars, nail bars, car washes or manufacturing. To help you understand the different types of modern slavery, [take a look at our leaflet](#).

Recognising Modern Slavery

Victims of modern slavery are forced, deceived or coerced into exploitation. It is often a hidden crime. Victims may be too scared to disclose what has happened to them, sometimes for fear of violence to them or their family. Some victims do not even realise that they are being exploited.

Help for adult victims of modern slavery

The publication, 'Help for adult victims of Modern Slavery', is available in 11 languages, and provides information on your rights and where to find support for those who think they may be a victim of modern slavery in the UK. Report your concerns

If you are concerned you've come across modern slavery it is important you report it if you feel safe to do so. **In an emergency, you should always call 999.** In a non-emergency, call the police helpline on 101. For confidential advice, you can also contact the [modern slavery helpline](#) on 0800 0121 700

Note for 'First Responders'.

The National Referral Mechanism (NRM) was introduced in 2009. The NRM provides adults access to: a safe house or outreach support; material assistance; a support worker; legal aid; counselling; health care and, at least 45 days when they cannot be removed.

Only 'First Responders' can make referrals to the NRM (Local Authority, Police, Salvation Army etc.). **Adult victims must give informed consent.** If an adult does not consent to enter the NRM, a Duty to Notify referral should be completed using the same [online process](#).
